

Introduction

The Forum originated in 1991 from a group of residents, the Whalley Range Amenities Group, who came together to draw up a management plan for Whalley Range (W/R) (used for the establishment of the W/R conservation area).

The remit of the group widened, and the Forum was established in 1995. The initial meetings had representatives from organisations including schools, GMB training college, Nello James Centre, residents' groups and statutory organisations.

Its purpose was to be a voice for Whalley Range particularly in relation to the delivery of services and it had a distinctive approach as a Forum (general meetings focussing on discussion and information sharing). Priority themes were worked on by subgroups (e.g. in relation to Empty Properties, Health, Police and Young People, Trees, Developers).

Over time Whalley Range and the Forum have changed.

From working without a base, in 1999 we moved into the JNR8 youth centre, and now the Forum workers run JNR8, a thriving youth and community hub and the provision of a range of adult courses and activities.

Changing Government priorities, world and national events has also impacted the focus of our work, e.g. Covid and the Cost-of-living Crisis. In addition, the role and powers of statutory organisations has changed and the Forum, rather than being primarily a way of identifying what was needed, became a deliverer of services.

Although we have received the major part of our funding from City Council programmes, over the years we have also benefited from Manchester NHS Local Care Organisation, Central Government, Lottery and many small grants programmes (e.g. from local Housing Associations). Our involvement in city wide partnerships led to the establishment of multi ward networks e.g. the South-Central Community Network (W/R, Moss side, Hulme, Fallowfield) (2002)(Central Government funded).

Community First (Supported by the Office for Civil Society) (2013/17) identified Whalley Range as being one of the most deprived areas in the country and via the establishment of a voluntary community run panel was tasked to identify local priorities, set criteria, administer and monitor grants and was able to provide matched funding to a range of local projects. This programme used participatory approaches and had a large emphasis on involving, recognising and training volunteers.

2019/2025 Development Plan

In September 2019 we carried out a facilitated, discussion-based day using participatory evaluation methods.

The meeting was attended by 15 people, committee members, plus representatives of local groups, (plus 26 questionnaire responses).

Compared to the 2013 development plan many suggestions had been implemented (e.g. activities) and the role of the Forum in community cohesion, networking and communication continued to be key. Our new priorities reflected awareness of the climate emergency, the impact it is having on our communities and the need to be resilient, sustainable and proactive.

The progress of the development plan implementation has been reviewed at each AGM with additional actions added.

The emergence of priorities for the 2025/30 development plan.

The Forum has carried out three meetings, one celebrating our 30 years, one trustees meeting and a development day which have contributed to the ongoing identification of priorities. Issues and actions have emerged through the planned range of Re:JNR8 envisioning/discussion activities. Alongside this was the submission and successful award of our OMVCS grant.

The application required the identification of how the grant would meet some of our priorities over 3 years.

We also Celebrated 30 years of the Forum, a good opportunity for reflection, review and development.

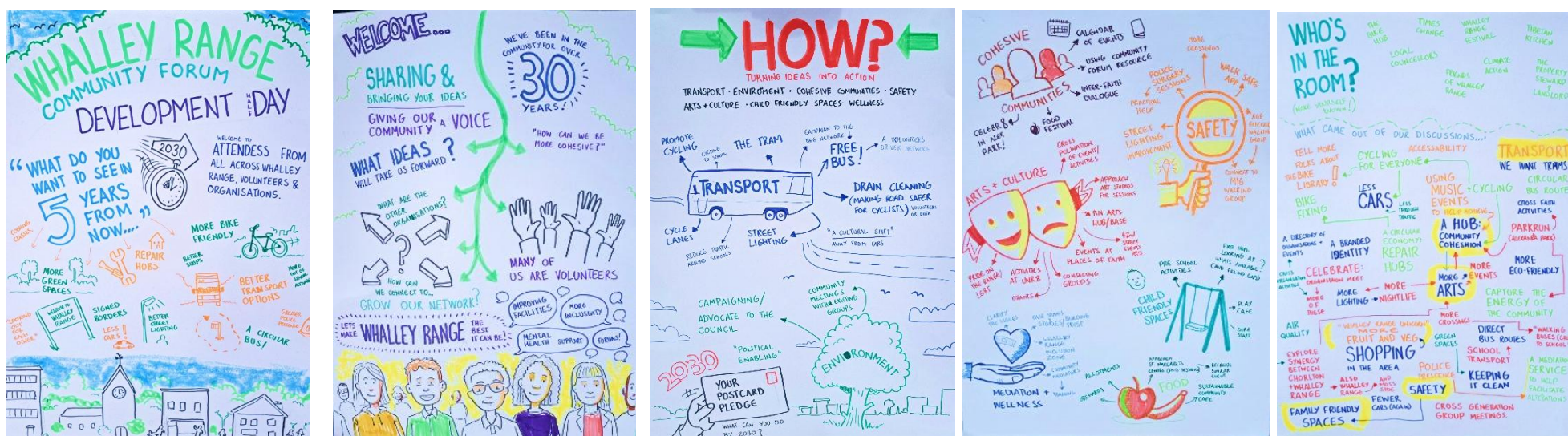


Re:JNR8 What next for Whalley Range and the Forum? (29/11/2025)

One of the Forums contributions to the development plan was the Re:JNR8 day using a range of participatory methods involving 30 people, (10 new to the Forum (4 African Caribbean (AC), 1 African (A), 2 Pakistani (P), origins) from a diverse range of 21 groups to identify themed priorities and how to achieve them, particularly the role of Forum at community wide level (e.g. Celebrate) and as a youth and community hub (JNR8).

A total of 61 different people (5 (A/C) 4 (A) 7 (P) 3, (I)) (33 who had never attended before, 30 of whom were women) representing 33 Whalley Range community groups /organisations (16 had never participated in Forum events before) took part in the 30 years celebration, the Re:JNR8 day and Forum general meetings in November and January 26.

They identified what the requirements were for the community Forum to enable Whalley Range to thrive.

These have formed the basis of the development plans actions.
